

MOHealthNet, Missouri’s Medicaid program, provides health coverage to low-income seniors, people with disabilities, children, pregnant women and very low-income parents.

The Children’s Health Insurance Program (CHIP) allows children in families with incomes above Medicaid limits, but who can’t afford private health insurance, to access health care through a per family premium structure.

In September 2017, MOHealthNet and CHIP served 1,001,388 Missourians.

Medicaid Provides:

- Preventative, dental, vision, and hospital care for over 2 in 5 of Missouri’s children.
- Over half of all nursing home care and Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) for low-income seniors and people with disabilities as well as those whose savings have been drained by costly long-term care services.²
- One-quarter of all mental health services and over one-fifth of all substance use treatment (including opioid abuse) in the nation.³ Medicaid accounts for 77% of funding for Missouri’s Department of Mental Health.⁴

In FY2018, Missouri will receive over \$5.7 billion in federal Medicaid funds, matched by \$2.2 billion in General Revenue and \$2.8 billion in provider taxes and other funds.
